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MARCH ILLICIT DRUG DEATH NUMBERS

Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General BC Coroners Service

The number of illicit drug deaths in March remained high, with the third-highest number ever for a single month.

Provisional data from the BC Coroners Service shows that a total of 120 persons died as a result of illicit drug use during the month of March, an average of almost 4 deaths (3.9) per day for the month. In contrast, there were 79 illicit drug-related deaths in March 2016.

Individuals aged 30-39 and 40-49 continue to account for the largest percentage of illicit drug overdose deaths during the first three months of 2017. Males accounted for 82.7% of the suspected illicit drug overdose deaths.

As in previous months, the vast majority of deaths occurred inside, with 54.8% of all illicit drug overdoses occurring in private residences. The remainder occurred in other inside locations (34.3%) or outside, including vehicles (10.4%). There were no deaths at supervised consumption sites or drug overdose prevention sites.

Chief coroner Lisa Lapointe noted that fentanyl appears to account for the significant increase in illicit drug overdose deaths since 2012, as the number of illicit drug overdose deaths where fentanyl is not detected has remained relatively stable since 2011: "The introduction of illicit fentanyl to the illegal drug market has had devastating results, with literally scores of our community members dying in their homes across the province. It has been just over a year since the provincial health officer's declaration of a provincial health emergency and, while harm reduction measures now in place are reversing thousands of overdoses, long-term measures to stem this tide must include meaningful education beginning at an early age and evidence-based treatment."

The BC Coroners Service continues to work with the B.C. government's Joint Task Force on Overdose Response and with health, community and law enforcement agencies to try to reduce this death toll.

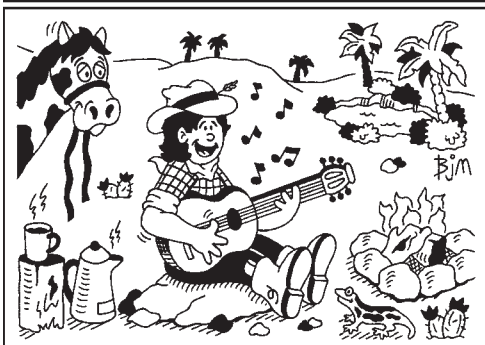

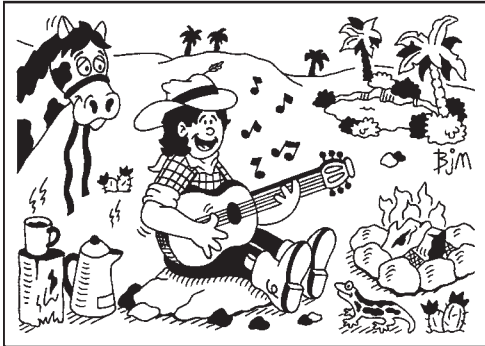

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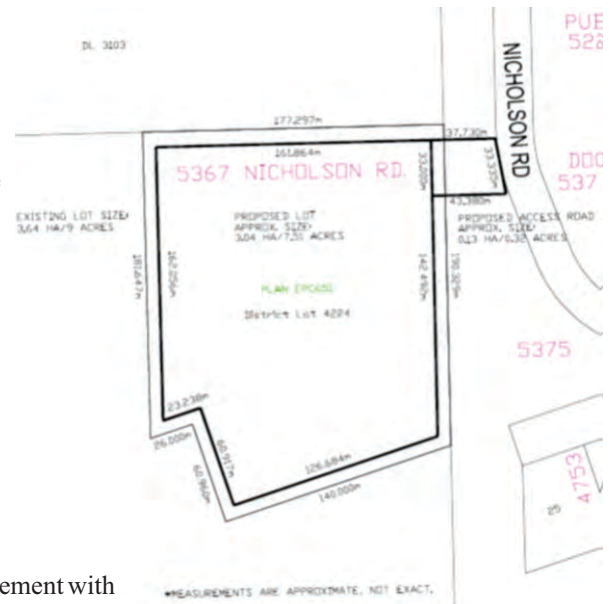

The property is intended for M1 (Light Industrial) use under the District's *Zoning Bylaw No. 1035, 2016*, as amended. By the end of the 18 days Chetwyndians had spent over \$15,000. The cool thing is, there would have been a huge amount of people that spent under \$20.00. There were only 16 business that participated out of the 100+ in town, which means that in those 18 days, on top of the \$15,000, the amount could very possibly have doubled. That is a huge amount, and shows how dedicated a lot of our town is to shopping local.

Naomi finished her presentation by mentioning that she and other Chamber members are working on starting another shop local initiative.

MEET THE MAYOR

April 28, 2017

Living in community with close neighbors challenges us to bring out the best in each one. It is evident that we need rules to which we mutually subscribe to govern our interactions. The collective agreement is a good example of an understanding that helps to prevent misunderstandings. It gives us a fighting chance of maintaining peace in the workplace. Long live a well-crafted collective agreement.

Of course all misunderstandings cannot be avoided by the best of collective agreements guiding the best of intentions. Human nature and the nature of language, of any language, is bound up in a certain level of ambiguity. Words tend to have varying shades of meaning. Subtle nuances depending on context and inflections of voice will add shape and texture for each of us. We are compelled, in most negotiations to hammer out a mutual understanding. This takes time and aggravates those whose tendencies lean toward quick action. It also does not contribute to the collective agreement's being classed, in most cases, with great literature. But that is not its purpose. It is meant to give direction and instruct proper behavior, not to inspire great flights of thoughts

Outside the workplace, all of us live in community, some in closer proximity to neighbors than others. In community we also need rules to govern our behavior, to protect the rights of all members of the community. These rules are called bylaws in the incorporated community. I will be the first to concede that bylaws, though well intentioned and frequently useful, are not always enforced the way they were intended to be enforced.

Bylaws that are not enforced in the intended way contribute to serious misunderstandings and frequently to loss for one party to a dispute or to another. Ultimately, unenforced bylaws contribute to communal chaos.

In most small communities, the bylaws are enforced based on complaint. It is the system we all have inherited. Good or bad, better or best, it is the system we have and the system we can afford. Naturally, this places a certain onus on each member of the community to know the laws and to adhere to the intent of the law. It is a small matter to pick up the telephone and call the Director of Public Works to learn if the activity I am contemplating or the building I would like to construct are permitted in my neighborhood. A small matter!

When it comes to the law or even to a bylaw, ignorance cannot be pleaded as an excuse. We all know that within communities there are bylaws that reach into much of that which, in a rural or remote environment, would be personal discretion. In most cases, my freedom ends well before the end of your nose. It's the nature of community. It's a matter of respect.

Then we have to consider the human element. Mistakes have and could yet be made even at District Centre, and once made, are frequently near impossible to reverse. We have to live with the consequences and, where possible, camouflage the results for the benefit of neighboring property owners. But a mistake made by District Centre with respect to Lot A, does not set a precedent for the same mistake to be made for Lot B.

This Mayor is a believer in the sanctity of the bylaw and will endeavor to uphold the law as it is written. Occasionally, when it makes sense to do so without violating the rights of the community, bylaws can be changed, but it would be presumptuous for a resident to assume that this will happen to legalize a violation.

Best advice for best results: call District Centre first.

KELSEY'S CHRONICLE

When temperatures start rising, snow starts melting and the sun stays out longer, you know that the bears are just waking up from their winter nap. With the bears coming out of hibernation, there are many things for people to remember and be aware of when playing in the wilderness. I have always been unusually terrified of bears and cougars, so when spring comes around I always try to refresh myself on wildlife safety and awareness.

What kind of steps can you take to be safe while taking advantage of the vast wilderness in our area? There are so many things to take into account when camping, hiking, fishing and hunting. The first and foremost tip is to keep your kids and pets close, or at least in eyesight!

Camping - While camping, be sure to always sleep inside a tent and never "under the stars." When cooking, always clean up immediately after, including washing all utensils used for cooking and disposing of dirty dishwater. At night be sure to lock all food, cosmetics, and bug repellants in sealed containers to eliminate their smell. Also be sure to pack out any garbage and/or food you brought in.

Fishing - If you notice a bear nearby, leave the area immediately and return when safe to do so. If you have a fish on the line, cut the line - it's not worth the chance. When gutting and cleaning your fish, do so in the river so as to not bring the smell and entrails back to your camping area. Chuck the innerds into fast moving water to ensure



the smell travels elsewhere.

Hiking - Stick to designated trails and obey regulations and signs and keep pets leashed. It's always a good idea to make noise and loud sounds. Continuously check your surroundings and watch for signs of bears: tracks, droppings, turned rocks, rotten trees torn apart, rubbed or clawed trees and fresh diggings. Solo hiking is never advised, even with the support of bear spray.

Hunting - Be sure to follow all regulations, and clearly mark bait sites with legible signs. When spring bear hunting season ends, please clean up your mess.

A few things to know about bears: They are as fast as race horses on flat ground, uphill and downhill. They are strong swimmers, and agile tree climbers (except full grown grizzlies) and they have good eyesight, hearing and smell. If you do encounter a bear, the best advice I came across was to slowly back away from the bear, never run, and never make eye contact. If you're attacked, the only thing you can do is play dead by tucking yourself into a cannonball position with your head between your knees and your hands wrapped around the back of your neck. Fighting back only agitates the bear, who will become more aggressive.

If you choose to carry bear spray with you when out in the wilderness, be sure you are using it properly. A few tips for bear spray: ensure the removal of the safety can be done in a flash (sometimes zip ties are used to hold the safety). A can of bear spray usually only lasts 8 seconds, so use your time wisely. A six metre range is about how far the spray will reach. Make sure you are pointing the spray low enough that the bear has to come through it. Lastly, only use bear spray if a bear is being aggressive.

Although I will probably never lose my fear of bears completely, these few tips make me feel as though I could take advantage of our beautiful wilderness with a little less hesitation, and hopefully you feel the same after reading this.
