AT LEAST TWO EARTHQUAKES RECORDED IN PEACE REGION SINCE SUNDAY

Scientists with the Geological Survey of Canada confirmed that at least two earthquakes have occurred in the Peace since late Sunday, April 15th.


Doctor Honn Kao of the Victoria office confirmed that seismometers picked up multiple seismic events in the past several days below a magnitude of 4. At 4:25 Monday afternoon, 12 kilometers north of Fort St. John, an earthquake of magnitude 2.8 hit at a depth of 4.7 kilometers. Another earthquake at a depth of 3.3 kilometers hit 25 kilometers northwest of Dawson Creek.

It hit at a magnitude of 1.3.

TWO HOLD AND SECURE SITUATIONS AT DCSS CAMPUSES

Two Hold and Secure situations took place Wednesday, April 18th morning at the Dawson Creek Secondary. According to the School District 59 website, the Hold and Secure at the South Peace Campus took place at 9 AM, after the school received a perceived threat earlier in the morning. Students were kept in classrooms and hallway traffic was restricted. Officers limited entry to the school by locking outside entrances. The school's Central Campus also had a Hold and Secure situation take place around 9:25 in the morning, and was lifted at 10:15. The Hold and Secure at the South Peace Campus was lifted around 10:25 in the morning. According to the School District 59 website, the RCMP investigation determined that there was no direct risk to students. School District 59's Director of Instruction, Mark Readman, says that the Hold and Secures were initiated after students were overheard on a city bus making off-colour comments about the Valentine's Day shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida. He went on to say that after the RCMP spoke with the



LEGISLATION INTRODUCED TO STRENGTHEN FAMILY MAINTENANCE ENFORCEMENT

Government has introduced two legislative amendments that, if passed, will strengthen maintenance enforcement orders and ensure that children and families have the supports they are entitled to through the Family Maintenance Enforcement Program (FMEP).

The first amendment will allow ICBC to cancel the driver's licence of a person with substantial arrears, creating the possibility of immediate consequences for non-payment. Currently, FMEP can instruct ICBC to refuse to issue or renew a driver's licence only at the time of renewal. This change will improve the effectiveness of child and spousal support enforcement by taking immediate action against those with more than \$3,000 in arrears, encouraging negotiation to resolve payment arrangements.

The second amendment, if approved by the legislature, will replace a requirement to file the entirety of an order or agreement related to child or spousal support in the Land Titles Registry, with a simplified requirement to submit pertinent information only. This change will streamline processes and help prevent the unnecessary public disclosure of sensitive information.

FMEP helps families and children who are entitled to child support and spousal support under maintenance orders or agreements. The program receives payments from the person required to pay maintenance and sends the money to the person entitled to maintenance. In many cases, the individual makes payments voluntarily but, if necessary, FMEP will take steps to collect outstanding maintenance on behalf of the recipient.

Federal and provincial laws already give FMEP the authority to take a number of actions against persons with substantial arrears, including passport-application denial and intercepting funds owing to the person, such as tax refunds and employment insurance benefits. Each case is evaluated individually, and action taken depends on the person's history, how much money the person owes, and other aspects of the person's current situation. Enforcement actions are chosen based on the best chance of success.

The changes are expected to take effect within 60 to 90 days, should the legislation pass.

Quick Facts:

British Columbia's FMEP is one of the more-successful programs in Canada, and one of the most cost-efficient in North America.

Since its inception in 1988-89, over \$3.6 billion has been paid through FMEP to over 140,000 families and children, who might not otherwise have received support payments. About 70,000 parents are currently enrolled in the FMEP and overall, the payment rate on all cases is approximately 92%.

MEET THE MAYOR

The Council of Forest Industries (COFI) has always been a highlight of the year for me. This year in Prince George Mayors and Councillors from across British Columbia were provided the 2018 version of the usual agenda. We got to hear from industry CEOs and Government Ministers, including the First Minister, about the state of the health of the forest industry in our province and the prognosis for the next few months.

The short version: for the most part, the industry is healthy, progressive, innovative, and pushing hard against the designs of the United States competitors while enhancing contacts elsewhere, primarily in China, India, and other Asian jurisdictions.

On the other hand, we have some challenges. Most obvious is the shortage of professional drivers to move product: logs, primarily. A few weeks ago I noted in this column the crisis looming over the industry because of the number of trucks sitting idle waiting for drivers. Those drivers are not materializing and it is not just in our town. The lack of drivers is presenting a challenge across Canada that likely will get worse before it gets better. It takes more than a Class 1 with Air to make a log truck driver—or any driver for that matter. The piece of plastic is just the beginning.

The rest comes with experience. And experience comes with hands on the wheel and eyes on the road, with chaining up and chaining off (maybe including the steering chain), with recognizing what is safe and what is unsafe, by learning when to pour the fuel to the engine and when to slack off. Time. Time. A time to hit the brakes and a time to refrain from hitting the brakes.

I have learned that it takes ten years of focused effort to become proficient in any skill.

The Beetles did their hard time stressing their vocals and flexing their fingers in Germany before they tested their worth in the United States. It might take four plus years to get a Red Seal credential in a trade but at least six more years of growth will happen before the artisan is fully proficient. So keep on truckin'. Never say "Whoa om a bad spot." This was my Dad's motto when he trucked with horses – not all that long ago as time is measured.

The declining herds of caribou also caught the attention of virtually all of us at the conference. It is not a new phenomenon but it is new on my detection devices. I would say that most of us attending COFI came away thoroughly concerned with the decline and with the implications of the decline. With the species now declared at risk and with Canada and British Columbia apparently committed to reversing the trend, we can expect to see measures enacted that may limit access to territory presently occupied by the caribou.

This is not a localized problem. Caribou herds across Canada are in decline and have been for years but serious measures to fix the problem may soon come to a back road near you.

In the meantime (and all time is mean), your friendly northeastern municipalities and rural areas are putting their elected heads together to try to find a made-in-the-northeast solution that will not excessively disrupt our well-established way of life in which we have tended to take the wilderness somewhat for granted. Perhaps those days are drawing to a close. Perhaps we may have to give up some of the wilderness in order to retain access to the rest. Perhaps not. If you have a solution (or even two solutions), wait not to share your wisdom with one of our elected heads.

Those were the big items for me at COFI. Of course we indulged in the usual networking to pick one another's brains on the latest successes and failures in local government. We were thoroughly entertained by the newest ideas from the economists. 

KELSEY'S CHRONICLE Earth Day 2018- Help End Plastic Pollution

This Sunday, April 22nd, is Earth Day and this year's focus is ending plastic pollution. Plastic is harmful to our oceans, landfills and even our own well being. What steps can we take this year to change our habits and create less plastic waste for future generations?

Right off the bat there are 6 steps to reducing plastic in your everyday life-Bring a reusable grocery bag, skip out on the produce bags, bring

cutlery from home instead of plastic utensils, bring your own coffee thermos, get yourself a good water bottle to cut down on single use plastic and store your leftovers in glass containers. Eliminating or even just cutting down on a few of these items can make a huge impact.

'Earth Month' here in Canada has a separate initiative they are calling #pledge4play this April, attempting to get kids outside more often to participate in outdoor play. Records suggest only 20% of kids get the recommended amount of physical activity and play as they should each day. Still not sure how a hashtag will help in this, but I suppose it will encourage people to get outside with their kids even just for a photo op...

Some other things that you could do around your house to help support a greener lifestyle get yourself a rain barrel and set it up under your drain spout. Or if you're really handy, you could set up an intricate array of eaves troughs to maximize your rain intake. You could also start a compost bin to help fertilize your gardens. Or the least fun option, but probably the most helpful- organize a cleanup party. I read an interesting article about a kid who at just 16 came up with a plan to help clean plastic waste out of our oceans, and at 18 he began campaigning to raise money to fund his foundation 'The Ocean Cleanup Foundation'. His first area of focus to eradicate is the "Great Pacific Garbage Patch" between California and Hawaii. His project is 2 years ahead of schedule and is set to start cleaning the patch by later this year. It's estimated to take approximately 5 years to clean 50% of the garbage patch in the Pacific Ocean.

Something also pretty incredible is the work of the "Litre of Light" project that has brought sunlight into 850,000 homes in 15 countries. This is genius for places with no source of electricity who have resorted to using dangerous paraffin lamps to light their homes. This litre of light is a plastic bottle that is filled with water and bleach that sits in a hole through the roof and reflects the outdoor sunlight inside, but obviously can only be used during the day. These reflective "lights," if properly installed, can last up to 5 years.

I always try to be conscious of the plastic that I use, and I always make sure to recycle, but it's time I start focussing on eliminating it all together. If we all made even just the slightest effort to reduce, reuse and recycle plastic waste, no doubt our world would be a healthier place for future generations.

CHETWYND COUNCIL MEETING

The District of Chetwynd held their second regular council meeting of April on Monday, April 16th. Councillor Laura Weisgerber was absent for the meeting but all other council members and the Mayor were in attendance.

The first presentation was from Naomi Larsen of the Chetwynd Chamber of Commerce with the chamber's quarterly report. Naomi began by mentioning that her quarterly report was more like a half year report as the Chamber has been incredibly busy these past few months. She mentioned that 2017 and 2018 has been an exciting time for Chetwynd's Chamber of Commerce. They now have 135 members, exciting new programs, and Naomi was able to take the Chamber's first trip to Victoria to talk northern concerns with the big wigs.

The new programs include the power lunches (which have been very successful), networking at night, and business after 5. these are all networking events where chamber members can meet and mingle with a specific member hosting each event. The next 'Power Lunch' with keynote speaker NEBC Resource Municipalities Coalition as well as the 'Business After 5' with host TD bank is on April 19th.

This years trade show had an estimated 2300 people through the doors, and the Chamber's financials are in the black after some penny pinching and hard work. This year's business directory has been well received and has actually turned a profit after Naomi did the work of the layout herself. She also mentioned that next year the directory may be in colour.

The next presentation was by Linda Garland of the Chetwynd Social Planning Society thanking Mayor, Council and Administration for their help with their '100 people initiative' by processing receipts for those who donated. The initiative saw 61 donations of 100 dollars for a total of \$6100. Back in March, 5 organizations presented why they deserve the funds and the Chetwynd Outdoor Society was awarded the \$6100 by Mayor and Council at Monday's Council meeting.

The last presentation was from Ron Millsap. Ron came to council to share his opinion on the concerning rising costs of living in Chetwynd. His opinion was that Chetwynd's Mayor and Council were raising taxes for frivolous reasons and that there was nothing to show for the huge increase in taxes over the past 8 years. Ron mentioned that according to his calculations taxes have gone from 8% to 29% since 2010. He also went on to say that the Economic Development Department is spending a lot of money but has not done enough to bring work to Chetwynd. Mr. Millsap's entire presentation can be seen on CHETTV.

Council moved on to adopt a couple bylaws regarding the 2018's Financial Plan and the 2018 tax rates.

Council decided to only send 3 members to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities 2018 Annual Conference in Halifax at the end of May.

Mayor and Council passed a zoning amendment bylaw regarding the lot behind Lakeview Inn and New Tokyo Sushi on to a public input period asking for the addition of housekeeping amendment allowing the owners to service vehicles on the industrial property.

Another item on the agenda was a proposed manufactured home park to be built in a lot down by the Airport. The lot in question runs between Nicholson Rd. and 50th St. SW behind 52nd Ave. SW. The lot right now is zoned as 'institutional' so it would need to be changed to residential. The application was moved onto the next step- the public hearing process which will be on May 22nd at 4pm. The proposed plan would be that each mobile or manufactured home is owned separately and pays a pad rent.



PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT WILL BE ACCEPTING PUBLIC INPUT ON TSAA NUNA CONSERVANCY

The provincial government released a statement today, indicating that until May 25th, it will be accepting comments from the public on the proposed Tsaa Nuna conservancy near Halfway River First nation. The proposed conservancy, which is intended to protect the cultural values and wildlife habitats of the area, is located about 65 kilometres northwest of Fort St. John, and would cover an area of about 5975 hectares along the southern shore of Halfway River. Last March, the Province and First Nation signed an agreement to work together to establish a conservancy in the community. The Province is seeking to understand the impact this proposal may have on third parties and the public. An open house will be held on Wednesday, April 25th, from 3-7 PM in Room 202 at Northern Lights College in Fort St. John.
