# ENFORCEMENT MEASURES BUILD ON SUCCESS OF NON-ESSENTIAL TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS

To help keep communities safe and protect British Columbia's health-care system from COVID-19, the Province has authorized site-specific road checks on travel corridors between regions to help enforce the non-essential travel restrictions that were announced on April 23, 2021.

On the advice of B.C.'s provincial health officer (PHO), Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General, issued an Emergency Program Act order to prohibit non-essential travel between three regional zones in the province. The regional zones are:

- 1. Lower Mainland and Fraser Valley (Fraser Health and Coastal Health regions);
- 2. Vancouver Island (Island Health region); and
- 3. Northern/Interior (Interior Health and Northern Health regions).

During the first weekend of the new travel restrictions, BC Ferries vehicle traffic was down more than 25% fleet-wide, and passenger traffic down more than 30%, compared to the weekend before. Resort communities and accommodation businesses have contacted the Province to note significant declines in out-of-region visitors and bookings, and BC Parks has reported more than 5,000 cancellations in the past few weeks. Building off this success in limiting non-essential travel, the province will authorize site-specific, clearly marked police road checks to further curb recreational travel.

The road checks may be put in place at any time until the order is lifted at 12:01 a.m. on May 25, 2021, (after the May long weekend). The road checks may be set up on highway corridors that connect different regions of the province to remind travellers of the order.

"These restrictions on non-essential travel are saving lives, it's in the best interest of all British Columbians to follow them, and I know most are given the significant drop we've seen in out-of-region travel," Farnworth said.

# Health For Your Home by Linda Franklin

This column is designed to address economical discoveries that will affect your health in a positive way.

#### **The Gut-Immune Connection**

To build up immunity against respiratory infections, take advantage of the gut-immune relationship. A healthy intestine will have over 2000 species of 100 trillion bacteria. This is termed our microbiome—a very individualized planting necessary to enable our immune-response mechanism. An unhealthy imbalance will not fight damaging bacteria, while a well-balanced fauna bouquet is well-equipped to inflict fatal wounds to unwanted invaders.

Probiotics play an important role, but should not be taken on a regular basis; better to get your probiotics from eating a wide range of whole organic plant-based foods. An imbalance in the normal flora of either gut or lungs, can lower one's threshold to a secondary bacterial infection. A healthy defense against disease can be built by healthy nutritional choices (fruits, vegetables, legumes, and grains), water, exercise, and 8 hours of rest (including 2-3 hours before midnight for cell regeneration). A diet that includes animal products, increased salt, sugar and refined carbohydrates, will build up a conglomerate of disease-causing bacteria that imbalances the gut.

Rather than introducing more food, however, the very best medicine for a restless tummy, foggy mind, or ongoing illness is complete rest from digestion for 12-17 hours (including hours of sleep). Take only pure water between meals. There should be a minimum of 4 1/2 to 5 hours between meals. Most people who suffer either gut or immune related discomfort are better off taking two meals a day rather than three, with the last food taken several hours before bedtime.

A word about night shift; recent studies seem to be proving that those who work night shifts should eat before coming to work, and then nothing until breakfast after returning home. A brisk half hour walk before bedtime will help induce a more restful sleep. However, night shift workers may experience somewhat shortened lifespan.



"But it is also important that we get enforcement right, and consider concerns raised by the public and incorporate the feedback received from racialized communities. I want to be clear that the intent of this order is not punishment, but rather education around nonessential travel prevention to protect us all from the spread of COVID-19. My hope is that every British Columbian realizes the tremendous progress we can make if we stay close to home, and we can give the heroes in our health-care system a fighting chance at putting the current spike in cases behind us."

When stopped at a road check restricting non-essential travel, police will only have the authority to request:

- A driver's name, address and driver's license
- Any available documentation regarding driver's name and address (for example, secondary identification that confirms a driver's residential address if recently moved)
- The purpose of the driver's travel (documentation regarding travel is not required)
- Police cannot engage in arbitrary vehicle or street checks. Site-specific enforcement measures will be informed by ongoing discussions with stakeholders on limiting the impacts to the public and racialized communities. If police have reasonable grounds to believe that a person has travelled for a non-essential purpose, they can direct the traveller to turn around and leave the region. These measures will be limited to site-specific and authorized police operations on travel corridors between regions.

The goal of these road checks is education and further discouraging people from travelling for non-essential reasons. If compliance measures are deemed necessary by police, fines can be handed out. At the discretion of police, a contravention of this Emergency Program Act travel order may be subject to a \$575 fine. The RCMP will deploy a trained, dedicated team to manage and enforce road check locations, and ensure interactions are in line with the intent of the order and all existing police policy and police standards. While the travel order puts legal limits only on travel between regional zones, the PHO's guidance remains unchanged throughout B.C.: everyone should continue to stay within their local community – essential travel only. It is a stellar example of a born artist's resilience and determination to pursue what many may perceive to be an unlikely career path. Fortier was raised on a small cattle operation outside of Dawson Creek, BC. Creatives are found on both sides of her family including spinners and weavers, as well as skilled builders and draftsmen. However, her family's blue collar background necessitated that they express their creativity through practical projects such as quilts and garments. Payge inherited this inner drive to create, and describes herself as an artist in her core. Her artistic spark ignited as early as she can remember. As a young child, she was "mesmerized" by her older sister's drawings, which she worked to emulate, and soon enough she was trading her drawings at school for better lunches. At nine years old, she took her first art class at the Dawson Creek Art Gallery, where she discovered her voracious appetite for all things art-related.

Thereafter, she attended every art class she could throughout her elementary and high

school years, after which she enrolled in Laine Dahlen's Visual Arts Program at Northern Lights College, which was sadly discontinued in 2014. Laine's program was pivotal for so many local artists, including Payge and myself. Its absence highlights the dire need for post secondary arts education in our community. After completing the Northern Lights program, Fortier transferred to Alberta University of Arts in Calgary. This was a difficult process for her, as no one in her family had pursued post secondary education before, let alone art school out of province. Navigating university and city life on her own was overwhelming for the artist, and she returned home before completing her second year. Payge remembers her time at Northern Lights fondly, and preferred NLC's small class sizes and hands on approach to AUAC's theory-based curriculum, stating, "Just because it's a big institution, doesn't mean it's better quality." Leaving Calgary in the rearview mirror, she was determined to forge her own path as an artist in the North.

Soon after returning, she began working at Picture It! Custom Framing, a position that situated her well within the local arts community, and introduced her to its many vibrant creatives. Ever industrious, Fortier bought the Picture It! in 2011, but found it a struggle to maintain her art



practice while running a business. She describes this time as a somewhat dormant period, wherein she could only sporadically attend painting classes after work. She was able to practice techniques, but because of time constraints, she felt she was not able to produce work she could authentically call her own. After becoming more established in her business, Payge was able to regain her artistic footing and created a body of work for Peace Roots, a group show with Caily Oldershaw and Justine Bouchard held at the Dawson Creek Art Gallery in 2019. Since the pandemic, Payge has moved her business to DCAG, which has allowed her the time and freedom to push her practice further.

As the Gallery's 2021 Bin Top Artist in Residence, Fortier has created Bos Taurus, an impressive series celebrating the way of life of traditional cattle ranchers in the Peace Region. In Bos Taurus, Payge solidifies her own visual language using expressive brush strokes, bold colours and clever layering. Through her skilled hand, Fortier brings out the liveliness and unique characteristics of her bovine subjects. Rendering them with a gentleness and warmth that originates from the true affection the artist holds for these animals, which are so central to the lifestyle and traditions of her family and community.

When Fortier encounters an obstacle in her painting, she reverts back to her drawings, which are the foundation of her art practice. Likewise, when she experiences hardship in life, she holds fast to art, which is her guiding force. "Art has always been who I am," states Payge, and it is with this clear drive and surety of self that she is bound to find great success in her artistic endeavours.

Bos Taurus is on display now at the Kiwanis Performing Arts Centre until June 4th. KPAC is open to the public during regular hours, so please stop by and experience the show in person. 
